## Old Age in the Wake of the American Revolution

### *Plans for Writing in the Fellowship Year*

Twelve months of full-time NEH funding taken between September 2023-August 2024 will provide the support necessary for me to write the remaining 50% of the manuscript as well as complete revisions. Thanks to five external short-term research fellowships, I have already completed extensive archival research. I have drafted and workshopped three chapters (6-8) with scholarly audiences including at national conferences and the Museum of the American Revolution.

In addition, I have secured competitive summer funding from my institution to complete a book proposal and two polished (revised) chapters to secure a contract in the fall of 2022. I expect to also complete the chapter draft of another chapter before the fellowship period.

This leaves me four chapters to write during the hoped-for leave as well as the Introduction and Epilogue. Conference presentations on the other parts of the book manuscript have provided the basis for remaining chapters and provide a path for completion of the entire draft by the end of the grant year as well as substantive revision.

I am confident I can submit the completed manuscript by the end of the fellowship period. I have held off seeking a press until I was sure I was close enough to meet a one-year contract deadline if needed. COVID-19 upheaval extended my original timeline. I can submit a completed manuscript before November 2024.

I would remain eligible for a one-semester leave at my own institution, which can be used to support any final revisions if the revisions take a little more time.
