or fifty years, the National Endowment for the Humanities has supported achievements in the humanities. Our grants have helped to decipher the lost journals of explorers, uncover hidden treasures in Egypt, and document adventures in the Wild West on film. As part of our fiftieth anniversary, we are also celebrating the work we've done for children, such as Youth Grants, Summer Seminars and Institutes to train teachers, and a perennial favorite: our Summertime Favorites reading list.

We recently took another look at the list and realized that very few of the books qualified as informational texts. In order to fulfill the need for high-quality, humanities-oriented children's nonfiction, we scoured nonfiction awards lists and crowdsourced recommendations. After extensive internal review and consultation with a panel of respected education and library science experts, we put together a list of books for five different age groups, including works written in a variety of styles that address the wide range of projects NEH has funded over the last half century.
