Description of project: The University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) requests funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities to digitize 100,000 newspaper pages of historic Kentucky newspapers for inclusion in Chronicling America and the Kentucky Digital Newspaper Program (KDNP). During this 2023-2025 NDNP grant cycle, UKL will identify and digitize-from-microfilm historic Kentucky newspapers from underrepresented populations and/or counties and out-of-copyright German-language volumes from across Kentucky. The KDNP will convey 100,000 digitized newspaper pages, microfilm assets, title essays, page, issue, and title metadata, and all batch deliverables to the Library of Congress.

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HISTORY AND SCOPE

Kentucky Newspapers: A Brief History

Brothers John and Fielding Bradford printed the first issue of *The Kentucke gazette* in Lexington, Kentucky, on August 11, 1787. Still a Virginia county at the time, it would be another five years before the Commonwealth of Kentucky became the 15th addition to the United States. Lexington was the western frontier, and *The Kentucke gazette* was the first newspaper west of the Allegheny Mountains.

The Kentucke gazette's rise quickly encouraged others into the newspaper printing foray, ushering in an explosion of rural weekly newspapers, even in the hardest-to-reach mountain hamlets and delta backwaters. By 1810, over 100 newspapers had been founded throughout Kentucky, and some had already folded. Political predilection fueled much of the growth until the more astute editors began to publish less for political candidates and more for genuine news. The latter newspapers were longer lived.

What became Kentucky's newspaper of record, Louisville's *The courier-journal*, began life in 1830 as the *Louisville daily journal*. The newspaper remained solvent through the Civil War, a fate far better than many. Newspapers in Kentucky enjoyed prosperity until the Civil War when the state suffered crushing economic and political blows despite being a border state. Most newspapers did not survive the beginning of the conflict. Of those that did, few were able to survive to the war's end.

The Kentucky press struggled for decades after the Civil War, but by 1880, newspapers proliferated again. Between 1890 and 1910, an estimated 600 Kentucky newspaper titles were circulated. That number continued to rise until the widespread adoption of the Internet in the 1990s began to chip away at revenues, forcing publishers into the online environment with crippling effects on traditional newsprint.

Varied geography, local economies, and travel difficulties bred a distinctly regional manner in Kentucky's people and newspapers. These regions are defined geographically as Pennyrile, Knobs, Eastern Mountain Coalfields, Western Coalfields, Jackson Purchase, and The Bluegrass. (Appendix A.)

An estimated 78% of Kentucky's population lived rurally in 1900. That percentage dropped to 48% by 2000; according to the 2020 U.S. Census, it has continued to fall. Despite this rural population decline, the majority of newspapers in Kentucky between 1787 and 1963 were county weeklies.

More than 2,000 individual newspaper titles are known to have existed over Kentucky's lifetime. Approximately 1,889 of these newspapers were published within a 1787-1963 date range. Some 830 Kentucky newspapers were published in 1960. These newspapers represent all six geographic regions from Kentucky's 120 counties, and the majority remain rural weeklies.

Kentucky Newspapers on Microfilm

As the state's flagship university, the University of Kentucky's mission to preserve the state's first records of history fell to the University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL). The UKL itinerantly microfilmed Kentucky newspapers as early as 1937 until a permanent campus microfilm facility was established in 1951. Thirty years later, in 1981, the UKL became one of the first five institutions to receive NEH funding for the United States Newspaper Project (USNP). UKL continued with USNP until 1993.

During USNP, over 4,000 institutions were surveyed, 500 repositories were visited, 5,000 Kentucky newspaper titles were catalogued with MARC bibliographic records, and over 1.5 million pages of newspapers were microfilmed. Many institutions either donated or lent hard copy holdings to UKL to complete backfiles of historical newspapers.

The UKL continued newspaper preservation microfilming of 175 contemporary Kentucky newspapers - including the acquisition, inventory, catalogue and microfilming of historic backfiles - until ending its micrographics operations in 2015. Today, UKL's master negative repository in a climate-controlled facility maintains over 30,000 reels of historic newspapers on microfilm, preserving an estimated 1,600 Kentucky newspaper titles.

More than half of UKL's microfilm was created to ANSI/AIIM standards, which helped define the technical specifications and guidelines established by the USNP, and later adopted by NDNP. A 2001 master negative survey demonstrated that UKL's pre-USNP microfilm meets the NDNP technical standards for resolution and density. Over the course of Kentucky's four cycles in NDNP, this "pre-standards" microfilm proved satisfactory for digitization and introduced some flexibility for future NDNP microfilm acceptability. Such discoveries are counted among UKL's early NDNP contributions.

University of Kentucky Libraries, Kentucky Newspapers, & NDNP

The University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) began digitizing newspapers as one of six inaugural awardees for the first NDNP award (2005-2007), henceforth referred to as KY-NDNP1. UKL received three additional two-year NDNP awards, the last of which came to a close in 2013 (KY-NDNP4). KY-NDNP was a key contributor during the NDNP's first eight years and delivered approximately 416,860 digitized historic Kentucky newspaper pages to the Library of Congress.

NDNP's first cycle guidelines in 2005 encouraged a state's newspaper of record to be selected for digitization. Kentucky's newspaper of record, Louisville's *The courier-journal*, has yet to be included in any of Kentucky's NDNP cycles. A Michigan micropublisher owns *The courier-journal* master negative collection, including reformatting rights. During KY-NDNP1, good faith negotiations were undertaken to purchase a set of print master microfilm reels, along with digitization rights, of *The courier-journal* content from 1900-1910. Those negotiations ended without resolution after a year into the first grant cycle. Instead, KY-NDNP1 chose 37 newspaper titles representing all six geographic regions of the state. These form the foundation of Kentucky's content in Chronicling America. This paved the way for future KY-NDNP digitization choices and provided a roadmap for other states facing similar microfilm access circumstances.

KY-NDNP1's (2005-2007) thirty-seven (37) newspaper titles amassed 106,661 digital page images spanning 1900-1910. Twenty-two (22) of these titles had content eligible for the KY-NDNP2's (2007-2009) expanded date range of 1880-1910, and four new titles were added during this cycle for a total of 100,946 pages. KY-NDNP3 (2009-2011), with its wider date range of 1860-1922, digitized 107,915 pages. The thirteen unique LCCNs were introduced during this time were preceding or succeeding titles of the original 37 titles. Under KY-NDNP4, 101,338 pages were digitized, and today, Kentucky has 79 titles represented in Chronicling America. (Appendix B)

This type of title growth stemming from Kentucky's 37 original titles was possible only through successive award cycles. It was, at the time, a phenomenon particular to pioneer awardees like Kentucky that had been restricted to a single decade's content during the first NDNP cycle. The expanding digitization date range has helped create a more holistic curation and digitization workflow for newspapers that are based on historical relevance rather than a cataloguer's prerogative (LCCN) or programmatic constraints within and outside of NDNP. This revelation, again, landed KY-NDNP among groundbreaking ranks.

The first NDNP awardee to digitize newspapers from microfilm entirely in-house, the KY-NDNP developed unique expertise, a role UKL was prepared for and one which NEH supported. In 2005, newspaper digitization was the frontier of cultural heritage digitization and access, and in-house digitization of newspapers from microfilm was unheard of. Soon after KY-NDNP1 began, other state institutions were eager to learn the processes developed by KY-NDNP and better understand the national endeavour of the NEH and Library of Congress partnership. As a result, in 2006, with NEH sponsorship, KY-NDNP developed metalmorphosis: microfilm-to-digital institute for prospective NDNP awardee institutions. From 2006 to 2010, metalmorphosis: microfilm-to-digital institute was held annually at the University of Kentucky. Here, librarians, archivists, genealogists, publishers, administrators, and historians, both foreign and domestic, developed the skills they needed for in-house and/or vendor-provided microfilm to digital newspaper creation. The three-day seminar covered everything from newspaper collation, imaging, and metadata, to microfilm inspection and NDNP batch delivery to the Library of Congress. In 2011, these in-person training modules were transitioned into self-paced online tutorials that are still used by individuals and institutions around the world more than twelve years later. http://www.uky.edu/NDNP/metamorphosis/index.html

KY-NDNP served the NDNP community in other ways as well, such as the development of a hosted/hybrid production model, a newspaper evaluation form, the formation of an iArchives User's Group, a short film based on KY-NDNP's in-house processes as part of the NEH celebration of Chronicling America's one-millionth page milestone. Available on YouTube http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5WjJLEhC4KQ and the KY-NDNP Website http://www.uky.edu/NDNP/welcome.html, the film takes viewers through each step of digital asset creation. Additionally, former KY-NDNP Project Manager turned KY-NDNP5 Principle Investigator Kopana Terry produced a short film for NEH about NDNP and Chronicling America https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=cpas8G6DLtE and worked closely with Library of

Congress technical staff on a variety of projects such as accessibility of color source document files in Chronicling America and DVV functionality in Mac OS.

Kentucky's Digitized Newspapers to Date

Though the University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) has not contributed new content to NDNP since 2013, more than 400,000 pages from 79 Kentucky newspaper titles are currently available in Chronicling America. During the 2021-2022 Chronicling America statistics cycle alone, these Kentucky newspapers served over 330,000 views to researchers.

Independent of NDNP, UKL has digitized and/or made accessible 1,188,682 Kentucky newspaper pages through the Kentucky Digital Newspaper Program (KDNP) https://kentuckynewspapers.org/program/. Most of these newspaper pages were digitized from microfilm, but this figure also includes newspapers digitized from the source documents (accessible in color or grayscale) and born-digital files.

Armed with profuse original newspaper pages of *The courier-journal*, the University of Louisville partnered with the University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) to digitize in full color their *The courier-journal* holdings. Many advertisements, comics, and special editions were printed in color, such that digitizing the pages in color made for a more historically accurate artifact than previously possible with black-and-white high-contrast microfilm. These issues of *The courier-journal* are available in the KDNP.

During *The courier-journal* digitization in 2010, UKL worked closely with the Library of Congress technical team on the possibility of adding full-color images to Chronicling America. Sadly, it was not to be at that time. Today, Chronicling America has evolved and can now accept color images, making it possible for Kentucky's newspaper of record to be included.

Beginning in 2005 and running concurrently with all KY-NDNP cycles, UKL's Non-NDNP digitization focused on newspaper titles that were disqualified from Chronicling America inclusion for various reasons, some of which no longer exist. Among these newspapers are included the African American newspapers *Afro-American Mission Herald*, catalogued as a periodical, and the *Lexington Standard*, with more than half of existent content found only on positive microfilm; *Omnibus*, one of several Kentucky German-language newspapers; and 55 historic newspapers captured in full color, including *The courier-journal* that was using an impressive four-color printing process at the turn of the Twentieth-century, a complete run of Cassius Clay's emancipationist newspaper *True American* (1845-1846), the extremely rare first issue of Henry Clay's Whig Party newspaper *That Same Old Coon* (1848), and the full run of the crown jewel of Kentucky history, *The Kentucke gazette* (1787-1910).

UKL's participation in the ASERL Cooperative Digitization Project, "Civil War and the American South: Primary Source Materials from the Region's Leading Research Libraries," played a large role in KDNP's growth. The UKL digitized content of five years before and five years after the Civil War, focusing exclusively on precursor titles of the state's newspaper of record: Louisville daily journal, Louisville weekly journal, and the Louisville daily courier as well as Louisville daily Democrat, Louisville daily express, and the Daily Louisville times. These urban weeklies and daily issues from the state's largest

city provided the most coverage of overall state history during the War and a plethora of runaway slave ads.

The accumulation of Civil War Era newspapers proved important for UKL's participation in *Freedom On The Move*, a national database of crowdsourced runaway slave ads from historic newspapers. Housed at Cornell University, *Freedom On The Move* was developed by several U.S. institutions, including the University of Kentucky's Dr Vanessa Holden, the project's lead faculty. Kentucky's political status as a border state, coupled with the defining border of the Ohio River, makes Kentucky newspapers ripe with runaway slave ads. Including Kentucky newspaper content in the *Freedom On The Move* database will provide researchers with exceptionally curated historical information for decades to come and drive them to the KDNP for additional relevant content.

Since 2015, the KDNP has enjoyed over 10.5 million views for over 300 Kentucky newspaper titles, most of which are unavailable in Chronicling America. In addition to historic newspapers, KDNP also holds contemporary born-digital content from many rural weeklies, such as the *Clay City Times*, which has public domain content in Chronicling America. The geographic distribution of newspapers across Kentucky can be found as Appendix C.

New Kentucky Newspapers for NDNP

Most of Kentucky's newspaper titles described in the previous section form the basis of new content possibilities for KY-NDNP5, including content in color or from source documents in grayscale. Through extensive conversations with historians, genealogists, librarians, and archivists, Kentucky's African American newspapers, including Louisville's *The courier-journal* preceding titles, are of particular interest for Chronicling America inclusion because they hold a wealth of Civil War era news about African Americans. Also of interest is the well-known emancipationist newspaper *True American* and *The Kentucke gazette*, both of which, among many others, have content pertinent to scholars of African Americans, slavery and emancipation. These African-American-centric newspapers will form the bulk of new content for KY-NDNP5. A full list of potential titles appears in Appendix D.

Kentucky was, and still is, a predominantly white, English-speaking state. However, numerous German communities were established along the Ohio River, many of which published native-language newspapers around the turn of the twentieth century. All of Kentucky's Chronicling America content to date is in English. Having Kentucky's German-language newspapers in Chronicling America will give a more historically accurate representation of Kentucky's population. German language titles for which the University of Kentucky Libraries' (UKL) holds master microfilm include *Omnibus*, *Katholischer Glaubensbote*, and *Louisville Anzeiger*.

METHODOLOGY AND STANDARDS

Access to Microfilmed Kentucky Newspapers

Having previously participated in four NDNP awards makes the University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) primed for immediate production if awarded a fifth NDNP award (KY-NDNP5). As noted earlier, UKL has a master negative collection of over 30,000 reels of historic newspapers on microfilm, representing 120 counties, over 220 cities and towns, and the time period 1787 to 2015.

Until the mid-1980s, the UKL followed the de facto best practices and standards until the induction of the UKL into the United States Newspaper Program (USNP) (1983-1991), which coincided with the revision and/or publication of ANSI/AIIM/RLG standards. This period ushered in the use of polyester-based microfilm and improved microfilm storage conditions. All microfilm created by the UK Libraries since the late 1980s conforms to USNP guidelines. A 2001 survey of the master negative collection revealed that most of the newspaper microfilm pre-dating the USNP meets the minimum NDNP technical standards for resolution and density.

Density readings of the microfilm will be taken approximately every ten feet to calculate a reasonable average density. Commercially produced print masters will also be inspected by the same criteria.

Unlike previous NDNP awards when UKL's Preservation Microfilm Department was operating, KY-NDNP5 will require vendor solutions for print master microfilm. As before, KY-NDNP5 will inspect the master microfilm to ensure it meets NDNP criteria for overall quality, readability, reduction ratio, resolution and density. This information will be recorded as part of the technical metadata package.

The print master microfilm will also be inspected to ensure vendor products meet NDNP criteria before digitization.

Selecting Kentucky Titles for KY-NDNP5

KY-NDNP5 staff will convene an Advisory Board of historians, genealogists, librarians, newspaper publishers, and archivists to select newspaper titles for KY-NDNP5. The group will review the proposed titles described in the History and Scope section under the headings *Kentucky's Digitized Newspapers to Date* and *New Kentucky Content for NDNP*. KY-NDNP5 staff will review with the Advisory Board the history of Kentucky's newspapers, including Kentucky titles digitized specifically for NDNP cycles 1-4, newspapers found only in the KDNP, and the selection criteria for newspaper titles eligible for this fifth NDNP grant cycle.

KY-NDNP5 staff will gather and provide geographic and chronological coverage information of potential Kentucky historic newspapers to the Advisory Board. From this list, the Advisory Board will select newspaper titles based on their research value, with particular attention given to African American, slavery, and emancipation scholarly needs, missing or underrepresented geographic representation of Kentucky, and availability of title or microfilm coverage for the KY-NDNP5 date range. Also addressed during title selection will be the statewide or regional influence, political, economic, and culturally

significant events, significant gaps in coverage, and African American or other underrepresented peoples or communities. The Advisory Board will also consider newspapers that have ceased publication or those without active ownership up to 1963. Kentucky's African American or emancipationist newspaper titles digitized by commercial vendors available only behind a paywall will be a consideration.

The Advisory Board will create a ranked list of titles to be reviewed by KY-NDNP5 staff from whence to appraise microfilm for digitization. Should Kentucky newspaper titles with previously digitized content in color or grayscale be selected by the Advisory Board, they will be factored into the final title list decision. From these points, a final list of newspaper titles will be selected for digitization for KY-NDNP5, totalling 100,000 pages. (See Appendix D)

Project Partners

The Advisory Board will consist of librarians and archivists from the University of Kentucky, historians and genealogists from around Kentucky with expertise in African American studies, and the executive director of the Kentucky Press Association.

The University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) houses over 30,000 reels of Kentucky newspaper master microfilm. This microfilm will be used for KY-NDNP5, and because UKL owns the master microfilm, no partnership is required for access. The print master microfilm needed to create the digital surrogates and deposit them with the Library of Congress must be negotiated with a microform vendor by KY-NDNP staff after the grant funding is awarded. By the University of Kentucky mandate, vendor selection must go through the Request For Proposal (RFP) process and will be factored into the KY-NDNP timeline.

The UKL has a long history with Newspapers.com when, during the first NDNP grant (2005-2007), UKL licensed digitization software from Newspapers.com's predecessor, iArchives. This experience formed a lasting relationship between UKL and Newspapers.com that has met with success at every turn. Once more, UKL will partner with Newspapers.com for NDNP digitization. From pre-existing scan collation, metadata, and OCR to new microfilm scanning, Newspapers.com will provide premium quality and service to KY-NDNP5.

Evaluating Copyright

In-copyright newspaper content is considered for the first time in KY-NDNP's history. It is unlikely, though possible, that in-copyright content will be chosen. If such a title(s) is chosen by the Advisory Board, KY-NDNP staff will evaluate and document copyright registration clearance. Suppose a selected newspaper title has published content beyond the 1927 public domain. In that case, the staff will use the Catalog of Copyright Entries on the Internet Archive to determine if it is copyrighted. Third-party content will be investigated, such as comics and fiction in selected newspapers. Issues with third-party products such as sales, out-of-print, or already available online will be considered. Suppose the title(s) is not listed as in-copyright in the Catalog of Copyright Entries, and third-party content is not for sale or is already freely available online. In that

case, the title will be cleared for digitization. These actions will be thoroughly documented and shared appropriately.

Conversion and Content Delivery

The University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) is currently working with Newspapers.com on microfilm digitization outside of the NDNP. UKL will continue to work with the Newspapers.com team for KY-NDNP5 microfilm-to-digital conversion. The Newspapers.com team is well-versed in the NDNP specification so that digital conversion, image derivatives, METS-ALTO OCR, title, issue, page metadata, and batch deliverables will validate with the NDNP Batch DVV. As with any digitization vendor, KY-NDNP5 will work with Newspapers.com on digitization issues that may arise before batch delivery to the Library of Congress.

DISSEMINATION

KY-NDNP Before

UKL has been most successful with prior NDNP dissemination efforts by creating, hosting, teaching, and then building the online modules of *meta I morphosis: microfilm-to-digital institute* tutorials. Short radio episodes featuring Chronicling America's historic Kentucky newspapers aired on WUKY-FM, Lexington, Kentucky's NPR affiliate. These were repurposed as podcasts, a short film on the KY-NDNP was produced, and both are available on our KY-NDNP website: http://www.uky.edu/NDNP/media.html. KY-NDNP offered multiple library school student positions throughout the course of UKL's involvement in NDNP, and most of those assistants went on to successful library careers.

KY-NDNP After

Since 2018, KY-NDNP has been quite active on the KY-NDNP Facebook page https://www.facebook.com/KyDNP featuring weekly posts from historic Kentucky newspapers. And since 2015, marquee historic Kentucky newspapers and collections are featured on the KY-NDNP exhibits website (KDNPX) at https://kdnpx.omeka.net/.

KY-NDNP Future

In addition to the continuation of the successful Facebook campaign and KDNPX, future dissemination efforts will include the refreshing of the *meta I morphosis* website, and the creation of a new and improved podcast series featuring historic Kentucky newspapers in Chronicling America. This podcast will stream from the KDNPX. As well, the Facebook posts will be archived on KDNPX for easy discovery and research. We will also pair with the College of Communications Library and Information Science students to develop lesson plans using Kentucky's Chronicling America content, and we will work closely with our UKL liaison team to become involved with potential UK course planning and further lesson plan development. UKL marketing and communications will promote

grant activities and accomplishments through UK Libraries website and UK marketing communication channels.

WORK PLAN

The KY-NDNP5 plan of work will begin September 1, 2023, and continue through August 31, 2025.

Select Newspaper Titles

KY-NDNP5 will convene its Advisory Board soon after receiving the KY-NDNP5 award. Two meetings will be scheduled; in October 2023 and November 2024. The first meeting will review Kentucky's historical newspapers, title availability on microfilm, Kentucky's title contributions to NDNP to date, and the Advisory Board member's charge in title selection for KY-NDNP5. The second meeting will provide the KY-NDNP5 team with the Advisory Boards' list of recommended Kentucky newspaper titles.

RFP to Print Master Microfilm Vendor Production

Per University of Kentucky mandates, a Request For Proposal (RFP) will go out to microfilm vendors upon receipt of the NDNP award. The process of selecting a qualified, affordable vendor should be completed by January 2024. This allows ample time for the Advisory Board to make their recommendations and title selection.

Hire KY-NDNP5 Project Manager

Running concurrently with the convening of the Advisory Board and the microform vendor RFP will be the solicitation of applications for a KY-NDNP5 Project Manager. A full accounting of the Project Manager's responsibilities is available in the Staff Section.

Microfilm Conversion & Scans-From-Source-Document Images

KY-NDNP5 staff will ship the camera master microfilm for selected titles for print master (second-generation) silver negative microfilm duplication to the to-be-approved microform vendor. Upon receipt of the print master microfilm at the University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL), each reel will be inspected for quality and assigned a Library of Congress barcode number with the corresponding barcode label affixed to the print master microfilm reel box. The barcode number, newspaper title(s), and date range for each reel will be added to an internal database to track the reel and its contents throughout the project cycle. The print master microfilm reels will then be shipped to Newspapers.com to create the digitization deliverables. Upon completion of the NDNP grant cycle in 2025, the UKL will ship all the barcoded print master microfilm used in the KY-NDNP5 content creation to the Library of Congress.

The University of Kentucky Libraries will use the digitization services of Newspapers.com for microfilm conversion as well as scans-from-source-document deliverable creation services. Newspapers.com will produce KY-NDNP deliverables to

the current NDNP Specifications, whether they derive from microfilm or source document scans. This will include metadata about the creation of the images in the headers for all image files.

The digital images from microfilm will be created from print master silver halide negative microfilm. The images will be scanned at 8-bit grayscale with a true resolution of 400 dpi/ppi. Newspapers.com will capture a standards-based target film strip at the start of each session. The target will be provided to Newspapers.com by KY-NDNP5 per the NDNP Specification. Newspaper pages microfilmed in the 2-up position will be split into individual page images with de-skew of no more than 3% and cropped up to 0.25" to the edge of the newspaper page. Targets on the microfilm will also be captured and retained.

Newspapers.com will retain the uncompressed TIFF 6.0 image scans from the source documents scanned by the University of Kentucky Libraries. They will also create master image files from the microfilm as uncompressed TIFF 6.0 images. From all of the uncompressed 6.0 TIF page image master files, JPEG2000, PDF and OCR text derivative files will be created with the same file name. The PDF and JPEG2000 files will conform precisely to the NDNP specification for their formats.

Optical Character Recognition (OCR)

Newspapers.com will create OCR text for each newspaper page image and provide one OCR text file per page. The OCR text output will be UTF-8-character with word-level bounding-box data coordinates. This will conform to the ALTO XML schema, Version 2.0, and create an ALTO XML file containing recognized text for each page image.

Metadata

Structural and technical metadata will be created for each newspaper page. The structural metadata aligns the pages to the appropriate title, date, and edition and the page sequence in each issue or section. Using the Library of Congress Control Number (LCCN) as a newspaper title's unique identifier, the structural and technical metadata will employ the appropriate LCCN for each issue title, date and edition order; and a unique identifier for each page to form a proper sequence.

For issues/editions known to be published but not available, the metadata will use the "Issue Present" to indicate the issue as not available. Newspapers.com will deliver all digital assets in Metadata Encoded Transmission Schema (METS) object structure according to an XML Batch template structure of NDNP Specification.


Batch Data Delivery to the Library of Congress

All the content received from Newspapers.com will be reviewed for correctness and validated with the NDNP Batch DVV before delivery of batch data to the Library of Congress.

Deliverables to the Library of Congress will meet the prescribed organizational directory structure and identification of the digital assets. Deliveries to the Library of Congress will be made through FedEx to allow tracking of packages. The digital

deliverables will be shipped on firewire-enabled or USB 2.0 durable external hard drives, sent in a single batch per delivery device, and delivered in batches of no more than 10,000 pages. Batches will be delivered monthly to the Library of Congress beginning Summer of 2023. See Appendix F for the entire workflow lifecycle.

Timeline



In September 2023, a job description for the potential KY-NDNP5 Project manager will be posted to relevant job sources, the Advisory Board will be wrangled for its first meeting in October, and the Request for Proposal will be distributed to microform vendors in the U.S.

In October 2023, the KY-NDNP5 Advisory Board will hold its initial meeting in which will be shared past digitization efforts with NDNP and KDNP, the lists of current newspapers on University of Kentucky master microfilm, and the titles and issues that have been scanned in color from source documents. The Advisory Board will reconvene in November to agree on a suggested list of titles for consideration.

In December of 2023, the KY-NDNP5 staff will make the final title selection from the Advisory Board's suggested list. The selected source document scans, if any, will be shipped to Newspapers.com for processing. A review of Project manager applications will begin, and a final choice of microfilm duplication vendor will be decided.

In January 2024, the new Project Manager will be trained in microfilm inspection and collation and begin preparation of the master microfilm for shipment to the vendor for duplication. The first of this film will begin shipment to newspapers.com for digital conversion and data processing.

The first valid batch of NDNP deliverables of no more than 10,000-page images per batch will ship to the Library of Congress in August 2024. Similar data batches will be shipped to the Library of Congress each month up through July 2025.

The barcoded print master microfilm will be shipped to the Library of Congress in August 2025.

Reports to the Library of Congress and NEH will be provided at prescribed periods throughout the grant cycle.

Principle Personnel

As Principal Investigator for KY-NDNP5, **Kopana Terry**, Curator of Historic Newspapers and Oral History Archivist, will oversee the program. She will be responsible for overall budget management, external NEH, LC, vendor communications, networking, and planning. She will supervise the Project Manager to be hired to manage the day-to-day workflow. For KY-NDNP cycles 2, 3, and 4, Ms. Terry managed most aspects of the NDNP program for the University of Kentucky Libraries, from title research and historical essay writing, film evaluation, scanning, processing, validation, and delivery of the data, to training other personnel, tending presentations and publicity affairs, oversight of the Advisory Board and NDNP correspondence, and overall KY-NDNP operations.

Co-Principal Investigator **Sarah Dorpinghaus** is the Digital Strategies and Technology Director for the University of Kentucky Libraries. She is the Project Director for the currently NEH-funded *Sounding Spirit Digital Library: Digitizing Southern Vernacular Sacred Song* with Emory University. As a co-PI with considerable background in digital services, she will provide KY-NDNP5 technical, vendor service, and workflow support. Her background as an educator also lends powerful experience for title selection and content dissemination outside the University of Kentucky Libraries system.

Co-Principal Investigator **Deirdre Scaggs** is Associate Dean of the Research and Discovery Division of the University of Kentucky Libraries. She has extensive experience in leadership and grant funding, having acted as Principal Investigator for two previously successful NEH grants *P.S. Write Again Soon: Revealing 200 Years of the American Mosaic through the Wade Hall Collection of American Letters* and *Coal, Camps, and Railroads*, and the Council on Library and Information Resources funded *Action in Appalachia: Revealing Public Health, Housing, and Community Development Records in the UK Libraries Special Collections Research Center.* As a co-PI for KY-NDNP5, her leadership will be invaluable.

Co-Principal Investigator **Catherine Seago** is the Director of Acquisitions at the University of Kentucky Libraries. She has spent over twenty years immersed in quality content for UKL researchers and access systems. As co-PI for KY-NDNP5, she will add copyright expertise to the team, and her background in classical languages will bring untold value to content selection and Advisory Board assistance.

University of Kentucky Libraries Imaging Specialist **Deborah** "**Shell**" **Dunn** will assist the KY-NDNP team with the scanned from source file organization for shipment to Newspapers.com and work closely with and train the to-be-hired KY-NDNP5 Project Manager in microfilm inspection.


The KY-NDNP5 Project Manager to be hired will oversee the day-to-day operations of KY-NDNP5. The qualified applicant will be trained in microfilm and newspaper evaluation, collation, digital image capture values and image quality control, page- and issue-level metadata collection, vendor relations, quality control of digitized packages, validation using the NDNP DVV, and delivery of NDNP batches to the Library of Congress. Duties include researching the Kentucky newspapers' publishing records and composing historical essays where applicable. The Project Manager will conduct project meetings, solve logistical problems, identify problems to delegate to other KY-

NDNP5 staff and be responsible for tracking production and cost data. The Project Manager will hire and supervise student assistants and assist with their training. Additionally, the Project Manager will work with the KY-NDNP5 team to present at conferences and develop publications and brochures for promotion.

University of Kentucky **Student Assistants** will assist with microfilm inspection and newspaper collation. Experience has proven that ramp-up and training with the KY-NDNP Program Manager must be established before students can be hired and supervised. Once hired and trained, up to two students, each averaging 10 hrs/week, can be managed by the Project Manager with the assistance of project staff.

As mentioned previously, over 1,600 Kentucky newspaper titles were published during the period of 1787 to 1963, a figure far too large for the purposes here. Rather, a list of pre-1963 Kentucky newspaper titles digitized and made accessible through the KDNP appears as Appendix E, and the KY-NDNP Advisory Board will be given a complete list of the remaining potential titles and the date range(s) of the microfilm master reels.

KY-NDNP5 WORK PLAN

The KY-NDNP5 plan of work will begin September 1, 2023, and continue through August 31, 2025. The work will commence in the following stages.

- 1. September 2023 a job description for the KY-NDNP5 Project manager will be posted to relevant job sources, the Advisory Board members will be finalized, and the Request for Proposal will be distributed to microform vendors in the U.S.
- October 2023 the KY-NDNP5 Advisory Board will hold its initial meeting in which will be shared past digitization efforts with NDNP and KDNP, the lists of current newspapers available on University of Kentucky master microfilm, and the titles and issues that have been scanned in color from source documents. The Advisory Board will reconvene in November to agree on a list of titles for consideration for KY-NDNP5.
- 3. December 2023 the KY-NDNP5 personnel will make the final title selection from the Advisory Board's suggested list. The selected source document scans, if any, will be shipped to Newspapers.com for processing. A review of Project Manager applications will begin, and a final choice of microfilm duplication vendor will be decided.
- 4. January 2024 the new Project Manager will be hired and trained in microfilm inspection and collation and begin preparation of the master microfilm for shipment to the vendor for duplication.
- 5. May 2024 The first of the print master duplicate film will begin shipment to newspapers.com for digital conversion and data processing.
- 6. August 2024 The first valid batch of NDNP deliverables of no more than 10,000-page images per batch will ship to the Library of Congress.
- 7. July 2025 Print master microfilm reels will be shipped to Newspapers.com for digitization, digital data deliverables from that microfilm will be returned to UKL for validation, and then shipped to the Library of Congress each month until the required 100,000-page images will have been fulfilled or July 2025.
- 8. August 2025 Returned to UKL from newspapers.com after digitization, the barcoded print master microfilm reels will be shipped en masse to the Library of Congress at the end of the grant cycle.
- 9. Reports to the Library of Congress and NEH will be provided at prescribed periods throughout the grant cycle.

National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) National Digital Newspaper Grant (NDNP) 2023-2025 University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL)

The University of Kentucky Libraries (UKL) requests \$322,526 in funding from the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) to digitize 100,000 newspaper pages of historic Kentucky newspapers for inclusion in the Library of Congress' Chronicling America. The budget accounts for raises and changes in benefits rates that occur every July 1.

BUDGET JUSTIFICATION

PERSONNEL

Senior/Key Personnel

Kopana Terry, Curator of Historic Newspapers and Oral History Archivist at the University of Kentucky Libraries, is the Principal Investigator for the 2023-2025 NDNP project. As a former project manager for the University of Kentucky Libraries previous four NEH NDNP awards, she has extensive experience with newspaper digitization, project management, and partnerships with NEH and the Library of Congress. She will contribute 5% effort (0.60 calendar months) of her time in providing oversight of the project with responsibility for budget management, vendor negotiations, NEH and Library of Congress reports, communications, networking, planning, promotional and public programming, and supervision of the to-be-hired Project Manager to manage the day-to-day workflow and training of the student assistants.

Co-Principal Investigator **Sarah Dorpinghaus** is the Digital Strategies and Technology Director for the University of Kentucky Libraries. As a co-PI for NDNP with considerable background in digital services, she will contribute 1% effort (0.12 calendar months) of her time to provide NDNP with technical service and support. Her background as an educator also lends powerful experience for title selection and content dissemination.

Co-Principal Investigator **Deirdre Scaggs** is Associate Dean of the Research and Discovery Division of the University of Kentucky Libraries. She has extensive experience in leadership and grant funding, having acted as Principal Investigator for two previously successful NEH grants. As a co-PI for NDNP, she will contribute 1% effort (0.12 calendar months) of her time to provide NDNP with administrative oversight. Deirdre will bring her administrative skills to ensure that it is both successful and promoted widely. She will facilitate work on the final project promotion and public programming.

Co-Principal Investigator **Catherine Seago** is the Director of Acquisitions at the University of Kentucky Libraries. As co-PI for NDNP, she will contribute 1% effort (0.12 calendar months) of her time to provide NDNP with copyright expertise. Her thirty years' experience and background in classical languages will provide valuable insight for content selection and Advisory Board assistance.

Other Personnel

NEH funding is requested for 100% (12 calendar months) salary and benefits of a full-time **Project Manager**. NDNP is a complex two-year project which will require the full-time attention and effort of a professional Librarian. The Project Manager will oversee all aspects of the film-to-digital program from title selection, film evaluation, scanning, processing, validation and delivery of the data, to training key personnel, presentation and publicity affairs, Advisory Board and NDNP correspondence, and overall NDNP operations. University of Kentucky Libraries Imaging Specialist **Deborah Dunn** will contribute 3% effort (0.36 calendar months) of her time to provide NDNP with training the to-be-hired NDNP Project Manager in microfilm inspection and newspaper collation and assist with source scan file organization for shipment to digitization vendors.

Two Library School **student assistants** (non-work student students) will be hired to assist the Project Manager with the project, and each will work 10 hours per week which equates to 25% effort (3.00 calendar months). The students will perform newspaper collation from the microfilm. This work will be used to ensure that returned digital data has been correctly scanned and compiled in page and issue order. This work will be performed during both years of the grant cycle.

TRAVEL

As required, NEH funding for travel is requested for two representatives to attend the NDNP Awardees meeting in Washington, DC. PI Kopana Terry and the Project Manager will attend these meetings. The travel expenses for these events have been calculated and adjusted for inflation for two people at \$3,000 per person. Expenses include lodging, airfare, ground transportation, and per diem rates for attendance at the 2024 and 2025 conferences.

OTHER DIRECT COSTS

MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES

External Hard Drives

Funding is requested from NEH to purchase twenty (20) 2TB LaCie rugged hard drives for the two-year project. Current pricing with shipping from a University approved vendor is \$120 per hard drive. All hard drives will be purchased in the first year. External hard drives are the primary mode of file transfer of the NDNP. Each batch of data delivered to the Library of Congress will contain approximately 10,000-page images, and each batch is delivered on an

external hard drive. Shipping of data batches for validation from the vendor continues as valid batches are shipped from UKL to the Library of Congress for Chronicling America, keeping multiple hard drives in play at any given time. The external hard drives are returned from the Library of Congress to UKL where they are retained for preservation.

Standard Format Film Target

Funding is requested from NEH for the Library of Congress required standards-based scanning target film strip that must be purchased by each awardee institution. This target strip will be scanned at the start of each digitization session to monitor scanning equipment performance. The *Standard Format Film Targets* are available from Image Science Associates for approximately \$1,300 per strip. http://imagescienceassociates.com. This is a cost incurred only during the first year of the award period.

SERVICES

Funding is requested from NEH in the amount of \$10,000 for outsourcing to a vendor the digitization of newspapers on microfilm, and if acceptable, the conversion and adaptation of source document scans to the NDNP specification. This cost is incurred during both years of the award period, with the majority of the work taking place during the second year of the grant cycle.

Funding is requested from NEH in the amount of \$25,000 to cover the duplication of the print masters of the microfilm used for scanning and for deposit at the Library of Congress. The price per reel ranges from \$45 to \$114. This is a cost incurred only during the first year of the award period.

SHIPPING/FREIGHT

Funding is requested from NEH for shipping the hard drives and the microfilm in multiple shipments over the entirety of the grant cycle.

A series of shipments via FedEx will take place over the course of the grant cycle. First, the master microfilm reels will be shipped to a microfilm duplication vendor to create a print master duplicate copy. This can include up to 250 reels of master microfilm shipped in multiple containers. Charges for these shipments are based on container dimensions, weight, number of containers, and insurance value. The total weight of 250 reels of microfilm is estimated at one-hundred pounds across four boxes size 12"x18"x10". The master microfilm and newly duplicated print master microfilm will be shipped back to the UKL where Library of Congress barcodes are applied to the print master copies. The estimated weight of 500 reels of microfilm is two-hundred pounds. The master microfilm is retained by the UKL. The barcoded print master duplicate microfilm is then shipped to the digitization vendor for digitization and shipped back to the UKL when the associated digital data has been deemed valid by UKL. All of the print master microfilm – up to 250 reels - is shipped to the Library of Congress for permanent storage at the end of the project per the grant agreement.

Multiple shipments of LaCie Hard Drives are exchanged between the digitization vendor, UKL, and the Library of Congress. Charges for these shipments are based on container dimensions, weight, number of containers, and insurance value. Each drive will contain one batch of approximately 10,000 page images of digitized data. Multiple hard drives may be in play at any given time, such as a drive being compiled of digital batch data at the vendor, one drive at UKL being validated, and one drive with the Library of Congress for ingest into the Chronicling America database system. A single hard drive will be shipped at least four times during the grant period: (1) a blank hard drive from UKL is shipped to the digitization vendor (2) from the vendor filled with digitized batch data shipped to UKL for validation (3) from UKL the valid batch is shipped to the Library of Congress for additional validation and ingest into Chronicling America (4) from the Library of Congress shipped back to UKL of ingested batch data for local permanent retention. This series will repeat at least ten times to reach 100,000 page images required by the grant cycle. Additional shipments may be required in the event digitized batch data does not validate at UKL or the Library of Congress.

The shipments are estimated in year one at \$1,000 (20 shipments @ \$50 per package) and \$1,300 (20 shipments @ \$50 per package and 1 final shipment @ \$300) in year 2.

ENVIRONMENTAL SURCHARGE

Funding is requested from NEH for an environmental surcharge on materials at supplies at the current rate of 0.78%

INDIRECT COSTS

The University of Kentucky has negotiated facilities and administrative (F & A) rate with the Department of Health and Human Services for other sponsored activities of 34% modified total direct costs.
