Overview

The Digital Humanities Start-Up Grant program is sponsored by NEH's Office of Digital Humanities (ODH). ODH's mission is to fund innovative, cutting-edge projects that use technology to advance the humanities. The projects span the full range of the humanities and often reach out to other disciplines, including computer, library, and information science. The program is designed to award small grants to spur innovation, test out new ideas, and act as a catalyst to the field. Some projects focus on specific humanistic topics while others explore new technology-based methods for research, scholarly publishing, collaboration, or public programming.

Since its inception in 2007, the Start-Up Grant program has received 1110 applications and has made 145 awards. Many of these awards have gone on to have a major impact on the field, often leading to larger implementation projects down the road.

At today's meeting, we will hear from the 46 projects that were awarded during 2010. Each will be making lightning round presentations on their projects.

His primary research interests concern emerging technologies, mobile and wireless computing, digital gaming, and social media. Other interests include digital writing, information literacy, project management, futurism, and interdisciplinary collaboration. He blogs at *Techne* and leads the effort at *Liberal Education Today*, a crowd-sourced, Twitter-supported conversation on inquiry, pedagogy, and emergent technology. Bryan also maintains the NITLE Prediction Markets. Committed to exploring computer-mediated pedagogy, he researches and writes on the critical uses of computers and teaching in terms of the interdisciplinary liberal arts and the contemporary development of cyberculture.
