Recent Project Highlights:

- Emory University’s Stuart A. Rose Library received a grant to update and digitize the *African-American Newspapers and Periodicals: A National Biography*. This comprehensive collection of African-American newspapers, magazines, pamphlets, and other materials is an indispensable guide to the stories of slavery, freedom, Jim Crow, segregation, liberation, struggle, and triumph.
- The Thomas County Historical Society received a \$189,952 grant to create a professional development program entitled *The Aftermath of Slavery, 1865-1954*. This program will introduce K-12 educators to the history of African Americans in the area from the end of the Civil War in 1865 to the Supreme Court’s *Brown vs. Board of Education* decision in 1954.

NEH also provides annual funding to [Georgia Humanities](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent Georgia Humanities Highlights:

- Currently updating previous content and developing new material for the New Georgia Encyclopedia, the first digital state encyclopedia.
- Supports the “Talking Service” program, which assists veterans in the transition from military to civilian life. Participants discuss the book *Standing Down: From Warrior to Civilian*.
