IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR INDIANA

Recent Project Highlights:

- Indiana University, Bloomington, received a grant to plan a permanent exhibition of indigenous archaeological and ethnographic objects. The exhibit will be planned in collaboration with indigenous humanities scholars and tribal partners to increase access to and expand intellectual control over these cultural objects.
- The Indiana State Library received a \$150,375 grant to digitize 100,000 pages of state newspapers, published between 1896 and 1963, for the National Digital Newspaper Project. The grant supports editions of the *American*, a crucial paper of record for the African-American community during the emerging civil rights movement, and *Witness*, an invaluable paper for German Americans in Indiana.

NEH also provides annual funding to the [Indiana Humanities](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent Indiana Humanities Highlights:

- Supported the Cedar Lake Historical Association (CLHA) project “Steam Through History” that tells the story of its lakeside community and museum building. The project includes a steamboat ride emulating the trip resort guests would have taken in the early 1900s across Cedar Lake.
- Indiana Humanities provides grants up to \$5,000 to state organizations to develop and implement public programs promoting civic education and helping address civic-health challenges.
