IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR NEW HAMPSHIRE

Recent Project Highlights:

- As part of the National Digital Newspaper Program, Dartmouth College will digitize and make available 100,000 pages of historical newspapers beginning in the early 18th century. This includes the *New Hampshire Gazette*, begun in 1756 and the first newspaper known to have an enslaved man, Primus, as its press operator.
- The University of New Hampshire will host two one-week workshops for K-12 educators on archaeological approaches to studying Indigenous and African-American history in the New England region. The workshops will utilize place-based learning in the Great Bay Estuary.

NEH also provides annual funding to [New Hampshire Humanities](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent New Hampshire Humanities Highlights:

- Through the *A More Perfect Union* initiative, New Hampshire Humanities will hold a lecture series exploring what responsibilities a citizen owes to others. Scholars will discuss how this view has changed over the almost 250 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence.
- The *Connections* adult literacy program serves 400 New Hampshire adults each year. This program provides accessible, humanities-based book discussions for New Hampshire adults with participants receiving up to four free books.
