Recent Project Highlight:

• Fort Yates, the tribal headquarters, received a grant to document two Indigenous dialects of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe for inclusion in a fully searchable digital archive of recordings and texts. As of 2017, only 250 speakers of these dialects were estimated to remain; efforts to document these languages for future study and cultural use are urgent.

NEH also provides annual funding to <u>Humanities North Dakota</u>, the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.

Recent Humanities North Dakota Highlights:

- Humanities North Dakota hosted an in-person public presentation by David Treuer, the *New York Times* best-selling author and an Ojibwe from the Leech Lake Reservation. Treuer discussed his book, *The Heartbeat of Wounded Knee*, an examination of how American Indian people exist in the U.S. in relation to its past, other ethnic groups, and to the modern imagination.
- Supports the We the People program, a comprehensive civics high school course, through free textbooks and teacher training institutes. We the People focuses on the history and principles of our constitutional democracy, culminating in a simulated Congressional hearing where students "testify' before judges acting as members of Congress.
