## **IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR PENNSYLVANIA**

**Grants to Pennsylvania Organizations and Individuals in 2022,  
including from the *American Rescue Plan* – \$11,452,398**

**Number of Grantees – 82**

### **Recent Project Highlights:**

- Pennsylvania State University received a grant to write the first comprehensive history of the Cherokee Nation since 1963. Dr. Julie L. Reed, a citizen and historian of the Cherokee Nation, is leading the project, which will address key issues of gender and race in this tribal history.
- The Carnegie Institute, with a grant from NEH, will create a traveling exhibition highlighting Black photojournalism from World War II through the heart of the civil rights movement entitled *Black Photographers Chronicle America, 1954–1985*. The exhibit will be accompanied by a catalog and public programming.

**NEH also provides annual funding to the [Pennsylvania Humanities](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.**

### **Recent Pennsylvania Humanities Highlights:**

- Supports a youth civics education project entitled *A Gen Z Constitutional Conversation: “A More Perfect Union” for the Future of Democracy*. The project will encourage students to reimagine the United States Constitutional Convention in the present day.
- The Teen Reading Lounge Program is an approach to book clubs for students aged 12–18. Participants create reading lists and design projects that connect themes in their book selections to tangible actions in their communities.
