## **IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR OHIO**

**Grants to Ohio Organizations and Individuals in 2022, including from the *American Rescue Plan* – \$ 5,876,153**

**Number of Grantees – 40**

### **Recent Project Highlights:**

- The Over-the-Rhine Museum in Cincinnati is based on one of the most architecturally intact nineteenth-century neighborhoods in America. The museum received a \$75,000 grant to conduct research on its 10-year interpretive plan. The museum consists of several tenement houses built in the 1840s by German immigrants, showing the neighborhood residents over time.
- Miami University in Oxford received a \$172,625 Institutes for K-12 Educators grant to create a 2-week residential institute to study the religious and cultural lives of first- and second-generation Muslims in rural and urban American communities.

**NEH also provides annual funding to the [Ohio Humanities Council](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.**

### **Recent Ohio Humanities Highlights:**

- Sponsors the telling the story of the struggle to integrate the [Lincoln School](#) in Hillsboro. The district refused to integrate after *Brown v. Board of Education*, in response a group of Black mothers marched their children to the white school, demanding admission, only to be turned away every day for two years.
- Supports the Ohio Humanities's Speakers Bureau, which provides for thoughtful conversation, facilitation, and reflection on topics relevant to Ohio today. Scholars in the fields of history, literature, philosophy, law, and archaeology have been engaging audiences and inspiring conversation for more than 20 years.
