## IMPACT BY THE NUMBERS FOR WYOMING

**Grants to Wyoming Organizations and Individuals in 2022,  
including from the *American Rescue Plan* – \$2,554,146**

**Number of Grantees – 9**

### **Recent Project Highlights:**

- The University of Wyoming Archaeological Repository received a grant from NEH to develop a collections preservation plan for its collection. This collection includes nearly 800 boxes of bone artifacts, 40 skulls and large elements, and 82 jackets from at least 15 sites located in the Great Plains.
- The Heart Mountain Wyoming Foundation received a grant from NEH to host two one-week workshops for 72 educators titled “Echoes of History: Mistreatment and Incarceration in the American West.” Through this workshop, educators engage in a vibrant curriculum intended to deepen their understanding of the history and impact of incarceration in the United States. The workshop instructors provide educators with guidance, time to reflect, and expose them to best practices in contemporary teaching standards.

**NEH also provides annual funding to the [Wyoming Humanities Council](#), the designated humanities council in the state, to support a wide array of public programming.**

### **Recent Wyoming Humanities Council Highlight:**

- The council funded a program titled “Why it Matters.” The mission of this program is to strengthen Wyoming’s democracy. In 2021, they partnered with David Alder, a constitutional scholar, to write in a weekly column about the nuances and discussion points of the United States Constitution. These articles were then published in Wyoming’s two largest newspapers: *Casper Star Tribune* and *Wyoming Tribune Eagle* for all audiences to read.
