To **strengthen the humanities at Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs)** by encouraging and expanding humanities research opportunities for individual faculty and staff members.




Awards support projects that are of value to humanities scholars, students, and/or general audiences.

Flexibility in project types and award periods.

- No cost sharing required
- Funds go to the individual faculty or staff member

■ Eligibility Requirements

Full-time, part-time, adjunct, and retired **faculty** and **staff** affiliated with an **HBCU** are eligible

- Open to U.S. citizens, and to foreign nationals who have been living in the U.S. for the three years preceding the April 8, 2020 application deadline.
- No advanced degree is required.
- You may not be currently enrolled in a degree program.
- *NOTE:* If you have satisfied all the requirements for a degree and are awaiting its *conferral*, you are eligible, but you must include a letter from the dean of the conferring school or your department chair attesting to your status as of the application deadline (April 8, 2020).



Key Program Details: Important Dates

Draft narrative deadline (optional): February 12, 2020

- Submit to facultyawards@neh.gov with heading “draft narrative”
- Follow instructions in the [NOFO](#) when preparing it (pp. 9-11)

Application deadline: April 8, 2020

Notification of decision: Late December, 2020

Earliest possible start date: January 1, 2021

Latest possible start date: September 1, 2022



Key Program Details: Work Plans

FLEXIBILITY IN WORK PLANS

- **Part time, full time, and combination** work plans supported
- **Period of performance must be continuous**

Duration: 2-12 months of full-time work (or the part-time equivalent)

Minimum time commitment: At least half-time for the duration of the award

Stipend: \$5,000 per full-time month (or part-time equivalent)

Maximum award: \$60,000 for 12 full-time months (or part-time equivalent)



■ Key Program Details: Project Types

FLEXIBILITY IN PROJECT TYPES

humanities research in primary and secondary materials leading to the development of books, monographs, peer-reviewed articles, e-books, digital materials, translations with annotations or a critical apparatus, critical editions, or other scholarly resources

humanities research related to institutional or community goals or interests, such as projects that draw on institutional or community archival collections, or the development of materials in support of culture or language preservation and revitalization

humanities research leading to the improvement of an existing undergraduate course, including the development of humanities resources (for example, oral histories, identification of previously unavailable primary sources, historical or literary collections)



Review Criteria

1. The intellectual significance of the proposed project, including its value to scholars, students, or general audiences in the humanities.
2. The quality of the conception, definition, organization, and description of the project and the clarity of expression in the application.
3. The feasibility and appropriateness of the proposed plan of work.
4. The quality or promise of quality of the applicant as a humanities researcher and (for course revision projects) as a teacher.
5. The likelihood that the applicant will complete the project (not necessarily during the period of performance), including, when relevant, the soundness of the dissemination and access plans for the proposed audience or audiences.

- Work plan
- Competencies, skills, and access
- Final product and dissemination

Submitting Your Application

1. Register now with [Grants.gov](https://www.grants.gov).
2. You must create an “individual applicant profile” in your account.
3. Submit your application several days early to allow time for technical problems.
4. Use the Grants.gov 24/7 helpline: **1-800-518-4726**
